**KONAMI CUP ASIA SERIES**

On November 13, 2005, the Chiba Lotte Marines emerged as the winners of the inaugural Konami Cup, a contest between Japan, Taiwan, South Korea, and China to determine an East Asian baseball champion. The initial tournament featured competition between the 2005 winners of the Japan Series, Korean Series, and Chinese Baseball Championship Series along with a team of all-stars from mainland China. The four-day event consisted of three days of round-robin combination (with two games played each day) along with a championship game on the last night featuring the two best teams from the first three days. Though the idea for the competition came from South Korea and Taiwan, the inaugural edition of the Cup was held in Japan, where all games were played in the Tokyo Dome. Prize money of 100 million yen was awarded to the participating teams, with half of that going to the Cup winner. The series finale drew a crowd of 37,000 and attracted 15 percent of the television audience in Japan, so a second series was held in 2006 and the Cup is now considered an annual tournament.

**AUSTRALIA**

According to legend, the first baseball game in Australia was played by American visitors in the 1850s. Australians first participated in a baseball game in 1879 when a local cricket team played a visiting minstrel group from the United States. Most Australians remained ignorant about baseball until A.G. Spalding and his Chicago White Stockings team came to Australia in late 1888 to promote the sport throughout the country. Spalding's tour was very successful and planted the game "down under" permanently.

In 1934, three Australian states sent their teams to Adelaide to compete for the first Claxton Shield. All of Australia's mainland states were participating in the competition by 1939 and, following World War II, the Shield competition would be held annually until 1989.

Controversy ended the Claxton Shield and left an opening in the Australia baseball world, which was quickly filled by Australia's first professional league, the Australian Baseball League. Unfortunately, the league proved to have a lot more talent on the field than off it. By 1998 it was clear that the ABL was in terrible financial trouble. Former ABL player (and major league All-Star) David Nilsson purchased the ABL's assets and tried to build a better league, the International Baseball League of Australia, out of the ABL's ashes. The new league was a disaster, though, and barely made it through one season before collapsing.

Australia today continues to do without a national baseball competition. However, baseball is still very popular on the local level and the country continues to produce talent capable of playing at a very high level. It is certainly possible that a new national league will rise again during the next decade, perhaps with the aid of Major League Baseball.

**COLLEGE BASEBALL**

The first college baseball game was played on July 1, 1859 in Pittsfield, Massachusetts between Amherst and Williams. Amherst won the game by the incredible score of 73-32. Baseball fans watching a videotape of such a game would recognize the sport's similarities to baseball, but they would also find the play proceeding very differently, especially due to the shorter distances between the bases and between the mound and the batter's box. Baseball's rules had not been standardized in 1859; by the time the first professional league emerged 12 years later, the game more closely resembled that of today.

Since 1871, when the National Association began play, college has served as a feeder system to the professional leagues. Its significance as a factor in the development of major league players has waxed and waned, depending on the importance placed by society on attending college as well as the scope of minor league baseball and the influence of international scouting. For much of professional baseball's early history, some of the nation's most talented college athletes chose a different career path than that of a pro ballplayer. As a result, the top college teams of the late 1800s and early 1900s were far closer to a major league talent level than college teams are today.

Despite talented players, early college baseball drew little attention from baseball fans. The major universities of the Northeast and Midwest played the best college ball, but they also suffered from the worst weather. After World War II, however, the NCAA created the College World Series, an event that slowly but surely increased the overall popularity of college baseball. The first two College World Series were held in Kalamazoo, Michigan in 1947-48. In 1949 the tournament moved to Omaha, Nebraska, where it has remained ever since.

The biggest difference between college baseball and major league baseball may be the aluminum bat, introduced in 1974 by the NCAA at the same it adopted the DH rule. Aluminum bats changed the college game dramatically. The higher-scoring games attracted more fans and fewer broken bats made it cheaper to run a college baseball program. Metal bats also made for a much rougher transition for hitters going from college to the minor leagues. The latter problem has led to the formation of summer prospect leagues, where top college baseball players around the continent use wooden bats. The most famous such loop is the Cape Cod League.

Since ESPN began broadcasting the College World Series in 1989, the popularity of college baseball has grown even further, especially in those climates hospitable to the game in late winter. After many years in which Southwestern teams dominated the CWS, teams from the South and Southeast captured the majority of championships in the 1990s. The lists below contain the results of every College World Series played, as well as the championship series played NAIA college teams, plus the Most Outstanding Player selections for the various series.

At the end of the collegiate championships are the winners of the two most prestigious awards for college ballplayers: the Golden Spikes Award and the Baseball America's College Player of the Year award.

USA Baseball, the national governing body for the sport and the organization responsible for putting together the national baseball teams representing the USA, was created by an act of Congress in 1978. It selects the best amateur baseball player in the country, who receives the Golden Spikes Award. The award does not necessarily have to go to a college baseball player, but it always has so far. The Dick Howser Award, named after the late Royals and Yankees manager, has been given annually since 1987 to the nation's best Division I college baseball player, based on his "performance, character, leadership and courage." From 1987-98, the winner of this award was determined by a vote of the American Baseball Coaches Association. Since 1999, the winner has been selected by the National College Baseball Writers Association. The most highly regarded annual college player award, however, is Baseball America's Player of the Year award, which the publication has presented annually since 1981. Eight players—Jason Varitek (1994), J.D. Drew (1997), Jason Jennings (1999), Mark Prior (2001), Khalil Greene (2002), Rickie Weeks (2003), Jered Weaver (2004), and Alex Gordon (2005)—have swept all three awards in one season."

The lists below contain the year-by-year results for every College World Series or championship series played by Division I, II, and III teams, NAIA teams, Junior College Division I, II, and III teams and California Junior College teams, as well as the identities of those who were voted the most outstanding player or most valuable player of

many of those series. Next up are the top ten ranked baseball teams of every year since 1957 according to the annual polling conducted by the newspaper *Collegiate Baseball*. At the end of those poll results are the winners of the four prestigious awards for college baseball players: the Golden Spikes Award, *Baseball America's* College Player of the Year Award, the Dick Howser Award, and the Brooks Wallace Award.

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The final three awards listed include the Roger Clemens Award, which is given by the Greater Houston Baseball Association to their choice for the best college pitcher of the year (before 2004, everyday players were also eligible and the award was called the R.E. "Bob" Smith College Player of the Year Award (1988–1995) and the Rotary Smith Award (1996–2003), the *Baseball America* Freshman College Player of the Year, and the *Baseball America* Junior College Player of the Year.
